What should voters know about your story?	I am one of five children with four sisters, two daughters, and three granddaughters. My goal is always to strive to be a person others can count on. One of the biggest issues facing District 1 are illegal housing units (stealth dorms). With the growth of the University, we have seen illegal conversion of housing. I DO NOT support a sweeping change in the single-family zoning ordinance. This should be done via the special permit process.	Pawtucketville is a neighbor- hood where many residents have chosen to live and raise their families. Keeping the district safe, clean and accessible to the multiple public spaces is paramount. My twenty years in public safety of serving the community has helped make Lowell a great place to live.
What disparities were more apparent to you during the pandemic and how do you plan to address them, especially using the federal Covid-19 relief American Rescue Plan Act funding?	The American Rescue Plan Act will provide a one-time infusion of resources into our community. As someone who has dedicated their career to budgeting and fiscal management, I understand the need to be judicious in our application of these funds over a multi-year period.	Education. Those that were in most need of being in school and learning have suffered the most. As a Council, we must continue to make our school buildings prepared for a safe and on-time opening by using whatever funds are available.
How could we attract businesses to fill empty storefronts?	The City is working on a three- phase plan called the Rapid Recovery Plan to assist compa- nies affected by Covid-19 that lays out steps for the downtown to attract new businesses and improve conditions in the area.	Keeping our city safe, clean, and welcoming to all are the best ways to attract businesses to Lowell. As a municipality that is very dependent on a com- mercial base, Lowell needs to promote the positives of running a business in the city, as well as working on issues that make it difficult to succeed.
How can Lowell build more affordable housing for everyone, including people who are currently home- less?	I have supported a multitude of affordable housing projects during my tenure on the City Council. Lowell has added housing units in many of our vacant mill buildings by working with Mass Development to provide tax credits for affordable housing and we should continue on that path.	One aspect of housing I do support support is In-Law apartments. This allows for our seniors, young adults, and those suffering from disabilities to maintain their privacy but still be close to family. Homelessness causes need to be addressed first and foremost as many have underlying factors.

We need to invest in outreach strategies to educate/inform our minority and low income residents.	The disparity that was most apparent during the pandemic was the increase of mental health issues. I will work to increase mental health, abuse, drug/alcohol counseling, and employment development ac- cess throughout our Centralville district and build a center funded by private-public funding.	Everyone deserves stable housing and nutritious food. Child care and school issues are important on their own, and they affect work for so many households. We must also work towards improving infrastruc- ture such as internet access to all and keep it affordable for ALL residents.
How could we attract businesses to fill empty storefronts?	We need to ensure our city ser- vices are fully meeting the needs of the residents and business owners. Investors are attracted to vibrant, clean, well main- tained and lively communities that take pride in its community. Accountability and proactive planning and delivery of services is essential. My district which is 4 includes the DT which is sadly in a state of decay. Homeless/panhandling, infrastructure issues and empty storefronts. These are challeng- ing problems that only be solved by bringing public and private interests together to enact a plan to address all with focus and humanity	An issue I've heard about from many voters is the upkeep of city streets: Trash piled up near bar- rels, decay of concrete (garages, sidewalks, bridges) and lighting. Trash can be solved by providing more resources to DPW. Lights, replace with LED fixtures where possible. Concrete needs more analysis.	The Homeless population is the biggest issue for most of District 4. More collaboration between the LPD, DPW, homelessness coordinator, mental health facilities (state and local) as well as private business owners is needed. Improving the lives of the homeless will have a positive economic impact.
What disparities were more apparent to you during the pandemic and how do you plan to address them, especially using the federal Covid-19 relief American Rescue Plan Act funding?	The worst disparities I saw were the gap between white and blue collar workers. While the former could work from home, many non essential blue collar workers lost their jobs. The stimulus checks were not enough. I suggest using the C-19 ARPA funds to supplement lower income folks.	Access to health & child care, as well as the ability to work from home or have paid leave are disparities across the racial and socio-economic spectra. ARP funds should be used to bolster our public health infrastructure and engage with the community to determine how to close other gaps with ARP.	Many jobs could be done with minimal disruption. That can't be said of everyone. From my perspective the economic disparity was very apparent and magnified for those that had children in public school. I want ARPA funds to be invested in physical infrastructure first such as high speed broadband.
How could we attract businesses to fill empty storefronts?	Entrepreneurs are attracted by opportunity. Opportunity looks like clean streets, safe sidewalks, ample parking and foot traffic. Lowell's leadership needs to address those 4 elements with diligence in order to achieve the goal of attracting entrepreneurs.	We should work to make sure that our commercial areas within the city are safe, clean, ac- cessible, well maintained, well-lit and welcoming. Working with property owners / managers to understand their challenges in leasing their space should continue to be a priority of the economic development team.	Collaboration of Public/Private partnerships need to ensure the city is clean, safe, and inviting. Filling the second/third floors will also increase the economic base to generate customers for those filled storefronts. Downtown is key, but focus must include "mini-downtowns" in our neigh- borhoods.
How can Lowell build more affordable housing for everyone, including people who are currently home- less?	I'd say the same way Lowell has achieved great things in the past, that is , a strong coalition of public and private investment/ partnerships. Lowell has some of the most generous people having seen it first hand helping dozens of Nonprofits raise 100's of 1000's.	This is not just a Lowell problem, we need to work with our part- ners at the State & Federal levels to help across the region. The answer to our housing shortage is not either / or, but "Yes, and ?" Focusing on building affordable or market rate housing alone will not solve the shortage.	I think the city can collaborate with local builders on the right mix of market rate and afford- able housing. The City also needs to lean on absentee landlords. A project such as Acre Crossing is a model example. I feel home- lessness is also a mental health issue, and more space/services are needed.






What are the School Committee At-Large Districts?



Each School Committe District is made up of two City Council districts.






