



While they hew closely to neighborhood lines, some districts span neighborhoods or split off small portions in order to ensure equal representation based in census data.





## What should voters know about vour story?

I served two terms on the Lowell School Committee and my knowledge of municipal budgets and finance background will help me efficiently allocate tax dollars. I will continue to advocate for Lowell residents. I made motions that brought science fairs and free lunch to all Lowell students.

My unique story: both challenges and triumphs: I moved to Lowell from Cambodia in 1996 and owned a home for 12 in South Lowell. Khmer Rouge soldiers killed all my family members. But I always have a burning desire to run for public office and to give back to the community.

I am an immigrant Cambodian American running for re-election in District 6. I am passionate to represent a minority-majority district and bring our residents voices forward. Lowell is where my wife and I choose to live and raise our family. It's a great City!

I am a proud veteran, a Lowell native who grew up as a multi-racial citizen. I've endured struggles that make me who I am today from being homeless as a child, to having an opportunity going to college and join the Army as a paralegal. Throughout my life I have learned the true meaning of community.

What's the biggest issue in your district and how will you resolve it? For those running at-large, what's the biggest issue facing the city?

The pandemic is the largest issue. We need people back to work, children back to school, and economic development to have the funds to address the quality-of-life issues. (cut-through traffic, streets, litter, etc.)

South Lowell has been neglected for several decades. I will connect SL to City Hall, with the voice of inclusion and diversity; together we can provide a quality of life to all. Potholes, sidewálks need to be fixed, trash needed to be picked up and cleaned up. Local businesses need to be supported

Shooting into residential buildings. I have sponsored and secured City Council support and testified at the State House to increase penalties to the shooters. People should be able to be safe from gunfire in their own homes.

Affordable housing and renting. To build affordable housing Lowell needs to work with nonprofits, contractors with local realtors and federal housing authority, to build sustainable housing and robust transition programs.

What disparities were more apparent to you during the pandemic and how do you plan to address them, especially using the federal Covid-19 relief American Rescue Plan Act funding?

Parents became remote educators overnight and they had to balance this with work demands. This disproportionately affected women. ARPA funds could focus on childcare programs, and vocational programs to help get them back to the workforce

I focus on outreach and engagement activities to reach all communities in Lowell in order to get them vaccinated. COVID-19 vaccine equitable to all must be honored and treasured.

The most vulnerable among us were negatively effected during the pandemic. Challenges in the areas of food, housing, and mental health should be priorities of future income to the City.

Healthcare access for older populations. With the pandemic it made it a lot harder for residents to get timely appointments. We should have mobile checkups to help serve the elder and physically and mentally impaired.

How could we attract businesses to fill empty storefronts?

Encourage the development of upper floors downtown, support small business incubators including MBE and WBE, address the homeless not having a place to go during the day and their lack of access to services.

Grants opportunities. Easy to access to applications. Multiple languages access.

Partnerships with the landlords, incoming new businesses, and listening to the needs of small businesses are needed to address the unique needs of the downtown.

We give grants and tax breaks to business startups. Because sometimes small businesses need a little help to get off the around.


How can Lowell build more affordable housing for everyone, including people who are currently homeless?

Support zoning changes for additional housing in the suburbs, housing walkable to public transportation, converting city/state property to affordable housing, and coordinating who is providing outreach to the

I will work with DPD and non-profit organizations such as CTI, to build more affordable houses as well as to find permanent and stable housing for Lowell's homeless population.

Lowell needs more housing at every level, but particularly for low and middle income residents. Partnering with agencies and nonprofits is important to reach our goal. Homelessness is a major issue and should remain a top Council priority.

To build affordable housing Lowell needs to work with nonprofits, contractors with local realtors and the federal housing authority, to build sustainable housing and robust transition programs. We need to take a broad approach to ending homelessness and looking at what causes homelessness.

#### What should voters know about vour story?

Married 31 years, 1 son, 4 granddaughters. Born & raised in Lowell. Built career in Marketing at Wang Labs & ED of Greater Merrimack Valley CVB. Proven success in driving revenue to City utilizing Tourism, Arts and Culture. Established Leader, Consensus builder & Advocate for the City & Residents.

That I'm a proud "Blowellian." Though we didn't grow up here, my wife and I chose to live and raise our kids in Lowell because we truly love the city. Its diversity, history and culture make it easy to develop a sense of civic pride, and I am committed to making it better for future generations.

I've been blessed with five grandchildren and I'm on a mission to make sure the City of Lowell is the safest and cleanest City in the Area.

Voters should know that I truly enjoy helping people. I am loyal, truthful, and I love to serve or I wouldn't have been a councilor for 26 years. When a resident has a problem I try very hard to correct the wrong and make it right. I treat every resident the same way I would like my mother to be treated.

What's the biggest issue in your district and how will you resolve it? For those running at-large, what's the biggest issue facing the city?

Downtown Lowell Neighborhood is the epicenter but First Class Education = First Class City. Housing, because it ties into so many other critical issues. Potential employers want quality, affordable housing for their employees; residents face skyrocketing costs; and barriers to homeownership prevent many families from building wealth. The City Council must take on zoning for more housing.

Alcohol - drug addictions-homelessness. Obviously the only way to resolve these issues is to replace the leadership and the current City Council. They are stuck on economic developDrug addiction coupled with mental illness. What we need is a huge building such as a segregate housing complex, where people can look after them, make sure they are taking their medication. A place that once a person got detoxified they are monitored to see if they are staying on top of their plan.

What disparities were more apparent to you during the pandemic and how do you plan to address them, especially using the federal Covid-19 relief American Rescue **Plan Act funding?** 

There were many disparities: access to healthcare, disbursement of vaccines, unemployment issues, limited \$\$ of PPEs. As a single mom, affordable childcare was critical to me 40 years ago and is still an issue in the fight against poverty. Prioritize funding to address all the needs.

Economic and racial inequalities are directly related to access to healthcare, individual health outcomes, and overall public health. During the pandemic we brought healthcare directly to people through enhanced outreach and mobile clinics. These are things that should stay well beyond the pandemic.

Mental health is a good place to start. We need to put some of this money into social emotional learning in our schools and Mental Health on the streets and in the Bushes.

It was frightening to see how many people lost their job during the pandemic. Businesses lost income with people remaining in their homes, so in an effort to correct this loss we could replace lost public sector revenue to strengthen support for vital public services that would help to retain jobs.

### How could we attract businesses to fill empty storefronts?

Create Curb Appeal for all neighborhoods; flowers, cleaning, trash receptacles; flags. Hold Landlords accountable. Downtown summit 2xs a year to measure success. Find the next generation of entrepreneurs. Follow the Jackson Street Model of Jam Plan. Be Proactive vs Reactive. What is our vision?

By finding ways to bring more people and foot traffic Downtown, and to our business districts throughout the city. This means more residents through additional housing (especially Downtown), and more visitors through marketing, special events, public art, and a better pedestrian experience.

Law and order is the main ingredient. Along with school improvements.

We could help to deliver assistance to workers and families, support small businesses with loans, grants, and in-kind assistance.

#### How can Lowell build more affordable housing for everyone, including people who are currently homeless?

We need to continue doing our job on affordable housing like we did @Rivers Edge but towns need to step up. The City of Lowell needs to invest more \$\$ in homeownership opportunities. Advocate for more State aid & CDBG \$\$ Home ownership = generational wealth; Home ownership =stable neighborhoods.

By making sensible changes to our zoning code to allow more, and more types, of housing to be built. For those who are unhoused or housing insecure, "single room occupancy" housing or in-law apartments can provide affordable rental options. We must also push developers to include affordable

Many people are not paying rent right now. How long do we think Landlords will sit around waiting for their money. Places like CBA is one non profit organization that accomplished a lot on affordable housing. We should find ways to support CBA.

We certainly know that homelessness is a public health crisis, more than ever before. We have the working poor whose pay cannot meet the high cost of housing. And, the reality is that open space is not readily available. I honestly don't know that I have the answer but we need to come up with a plan.

## What should voters know about your story?

My family came to the US as refugees from Cambodia. Grateful for the aide from Catholic Charities, helping others became part of my DNA and I've worked in public safety for 31 years. I have served on the Lowell City Council for the past two terms and always focus on keeping people working together.

I have been proud to call Lowell home for half of my life where I met my wife, Aleksandra, & purchased our 1st home together. We both graduated from UMass Lowell and we are raising our young sons, Samuel and Ellis, as well. I also founded and run a recruiting firm in Lowell, The Leap Network, LLC.

What's the biggest issue in your district and how will you resolve it? For those running at-large, what's the biggest issue facing the city?

We need to tackle homelessness. We need more and better jobs, affordable housing, and more resources for those with mental health problems. We need to seek state and federal grants, make good use of the American Rescue Act funds, and partner with our local non-profits to get this done.

The issues that we're facing this year are centered around representation, the health & wellness of the City and also having the right City Council team in place to be proactive & innovative in solving problems of today & tomorrow. With the right team, we can face any problem.

#### What disparities were more apparent to you during the pandemic and how do you plan to address them, especially using the federal Covid-19 relief American Rescue Plan Act funding?

The pandemic hit the less fortunate the hardest. Many residents who worked multiple jobs lost one or more of those jobs and the essential extra income that came with them. Low-income families whose children had to begin online schooling did not have tablets or access to wi-fi service.

The pandemic has affected all of us, particularly among low-income, elderly and BIPOC communities, as well as small businesses. We must listen to & understand these communities better. Through ARPA, we have a once in a lifetime opportunity to bridge real gaps & strengthen Lowell. Let's Be Bold!

## How could we attract businesses to fill empty storefronts?

I support the Manager's efforts with Small Business Emergency Relief Grant, which has given founding to 46 local businesses. I asked DPD to look for grants to incentivize building owners to renovate upper floors for residential or office space. This will increase foot traffic and help businesses.

Increase grants, incentives, & subsidies for local entrepreneurs to occupy vacant storefronts. Hire an economic dev. biz specialist to strengthen engagement, collaboration, & retention of existing downtown & neighborhood businesses. Strengthen partnerships with local business accelerator programs.

#### How can Lowell build more affordable housing for everyone, including people who are currently homeless?

We have \$2.6M to support affordable housing, historic resources, and open space through CPA. I proposed that we participate in the fund—it was put on the 2019 ballot and won nearly 60% of the vote. We need better paying jobs, and more mental health assistance as it is a major cause of homelessness.

At the intersection of health, wellness, & prosperity is housing. The homeless need homes! Lowell must increase and, when appropriate, redevelop available housing stock. We need aggressive funding and less restrictions for down-payment & closing cost programs. We need more mixed-income housing.







What should voters know about your story?

I am a 31-year resident of Lowell, 27 of which have been in Pawtucketville with my wife, Valerie and three adult children who are all products of Lowell Public Schools. I moved to Lowell from Nigeria for graduate school at UMass, Lowell. I am an entrepreneur who owns Duziem Labs in the Highlands.

Education is something I believe in because of its power to not just inform but to open doors. As a teacher of 11 years (8 in Lowell), I was fortunate to empower, advocate for and educate students that felt forgotten. My history of fighting for equity and amplifying voices is document-

I am a parent of a middle schooler. I believe focusing on communication, collaboration, diversity, equity and inclusion will continue to raise LPS towards excellence.

I was born and raised in Lowell. Attended Lowell Public School from kindergarten to high school. I have an 8-year-old son that attends Lowell Public Schools. I have had the pleasure of working as a special education teacher for 16 years now.

What's the biggest issue in your district and how will you resolve it? For those running at-large, what's the biggest issue facing the city?

Though I am still listening to residents, busing, maintenance and food seem to come up often. These are new and district-specific issues which, because of the new districting, present a fresh set of challenges. In the backdrop of what will be best for our city, I am still thinking them through.

As many districts will say, District 1 has strong schools. There are still general needs for updates, upkeep and varied levels of maintenance. The lack of cultural diversity/equity in educators is the most noticeable of the district's issues.

Many of the Renaissance schools are in district 2. We need to continue to prioritize providing these schools with what they need to help their students learn and thrive, which will elevate the schools out of this status

Equality in receiving information from administration in order to accurately inform teachers who are the direct communicators with our parents. If teachers do not receive accurate information: How can they inform parents? Also, ventilation and heat instability in buildings.

What plans do you have to increase funding to the schools? How would you use those new funds?

I will seek ways to increase grant applications targeting specific projects. e.g. online learning, early childhood education and gifted programs. I will encourage more individual schools to get involved with expanding such projects. Because of Lowell demography, proactively seek out Title 1 funds.

Whether it be applicable grants or private industry, solidifying its sustainability is paramount. In using the funds, I would consult with the experts: teachers, paras, parents and students. Of some areas I would address: special ed, the arts, staffing for paras, social workers and equity.

We must continue to advocate for appropriate levels of state funding. We should also hold the city accountable for properly planning & funding continuous & required improvement of our school buildings. Funds should go to schools for SSC's to decide use based on their specific goals

Analyze where there is a need to increase funding in the schools. Assure those funds were used to address the actual need for the increase in funding.

What is your plan to better involve both staff and public school families in decision making?

Establishment of School Site Councils in every building is a state mandate. I will encourage the central office to make sure this is implemented. When I headed the Citywide Parent Council, I observed that we were not compliant. This is an excellent way of providing voice to staff and families

I'd create a working group pilot: inclusive of curriculum designers, and Lowell experts in the classroom, in the social work space, including also both parents and students. This working group would look not only at curriculum content, but the styles of presenting the materials as one example.

We must continue to encourage staff and families to get involved in SSC's. These meetings should be accessible and there should be ways to gather input from those that are unable to attend. Also sharing best practices between schools related to family engagement.

Administration must have clear lines of communication of pertinent information to all school principals in order to disseminate accurate information to teachers and families.

Is our curriculum across the grades and school evidence based, and in what ways are community members and students involved in developing and improving curriculum? There is a great deal of variance in the curriculum across our schools. I would encourage a serious exercise of alignment between the various schools. As a school committee member, I will encourage my colleagues to seek opportunities for the community and students to get involved in this exercise.

Though some is, curriculum is not all evidence based as that implies proven theory. It's also based on observations, historically accepted data, vantage points, etc. Typically, community and students are not involved it's development, often it's a mix of faculty, upper management, and consultants.

Our curriculum is evidence based and MA standards are some of the best in the country, however we as a community should be working together to incorporate culturally and linguistically sustaining practices into all classrooms.

Our curriculums may be evidence based, but frequent changes to these curriculums hinder our student's progress. If anything, our students need consistency in their own school grade curriculum. These curriculums must take into account English Language Learners, and students who process slower.



What's the biggest issue in your district and how will you resolve it? For those running at-large, what's the biggest issue facing the city?

#### What plans do you have to increase funding to the schools? How would you use those new funds?

Funds must be directed to programs that directly help our students and teachers in the classroom. #### What is your plan to better involve both staff and public school families in decision making?

As a school committee member, I will advocate for working together as a community, providing more communication, cooperation and coordination between students, parents, teachers, & administrators ensuring Lowell families have ample opportunity to partner with schools for our children's future.

We have already established School Site Councils for this purpose. We (School Committee) will be monitoring them to find out exactly what our parents believe is a need in their schools.

For parents to want to get involved, LPS as well as City, need to provide them with the up to date information the way they would understand. School Site Parent Councils is one place. Also sending information directly to parents including electronically about the importance of their participation.

Is our curriculum across the grades and school evidence based, and in what ways are community members and students involved in developing and improving curriculum? Parents and students should be involved in helping to identify gaps in classroom resources, curriculum, and in suggesting culturally diverse options that will help supplement the curriculum and allow students to gain a multi-cultural perspective on a variety of topics.

For the most part, I believe it is already evidence based. The district is always evaluating the current curriculum, and decide whether or not the curriculum needs to be updated.

What should voters know about your story?

Five years before I ever ran for school committee, I was working to improve our schools and get school funding we need as an outspoken leader on the Citywide Parent Council. My commitment to excellent public schools and opportunities for each child to succeed drives every decision I make.

All of my professional non-profit experience, along with my service on the Lowell School Committee, have taught me the value of committed community involvement and each step along the way has made me more and more ambitious for what our school system can achieve.

Born in Iowa and bring those values to my adopted city of Lowell. Accountant for 7 years, saving Wang \$2 million. Taught for 20 years in Massachusetts and a principal for 3. Graduated UMass Lowell and studied computers at Fitchburg. Married to Vickie and have 4 children and four grandchildren.

What's the biggest issue in your district and how will you resolve it? For those running at-large, what's the biggest issue facing the city?

The biggest issue in the city right now is individual health. Our children need to be active, socialize, and learn how to take care of their bodies. The physical and mental well-being of every individual should be a focal point of our recovery efforts.

The biggest issue facing the schools right now is using the federal funds wisely to have the most positive impact on the most students--especially those with the highest needs. That means building staff capacity and having supports to offset the emotional toll and learning loss from the pandemic.

Our effective response to the challenges of the ongoing pandemic and its damaging impact on all of our students and their families. That includes safely opening our schools to in-person learning and supporting educational and mental health interventions for all of our The formation and construction of the High School. We can not afford slippage and mistakes in Construction. As for formation, we need to maintain the Latin Lyceum, while working to expand access to vocational education through cooperation with Great Lowell Technical High

What plans do you have to increase funding to the schools? How would you use those new funds?

There is opportunity for large savings on transportation. Our current district map and school assignment policy are inefficient. We could provide a much better product and meet ALL of our transportation needs in the district with a revamp of these policies.

I push for educational dollars by reaching out to legislative leaders at the state house and the city council, as well as joining with the Mass. Assoc. of School Committees. We must use and distribute the funds wisely and fairly to provide each child with the resources they need to learn.

We must spend the recent increase in federal funds on classroom based positions to ensure that our students, who have been so dramatically impacted by the pandemic's disruption of their education, can be given the appropriate teaching and tutor based interventions to make up critical ground.

Our funding is fixed by the General Court and the City. New funds should be given to those on our support staff. Next in order is books, as reading has to be desired by the School Committee. Then teacher's pay raises. Children at an early age have to be on schedule for reading every day.

What is your plan to better involve both staff and public school families in decision making?

I think talking to people and being present in the community is the best way to get input from families. It is difficult for many parents to stay connected and provide their own opinions. I would encourage people to reach out to me, or sign up to speak at a meeting. Your thoughts will be heard.

I support empowering school site councils with building-based budget decisions and I have repeatedly asked for training/access for these groups. Frontline staff and parents must be heard. We need better 2-way communication and a collaborative mindset where their input is valued and acted upon.

I have supported the school site budgeting process, however, I believe that this new effort still requires additional facilitation and training to ensure that parent, teacher and community voices are clearly and respectfully heard during the entire decision making process.


Studies show Parents are key to student success, so first we must involve parents in their children's education at home and in schools. Progress often comes from new ideas and public hearings are ways of gaining input from both staff and families. And parents must get close to Committee members.

Is our curriculum across the grades and school evidence based, and in what ways are community members and students involved in developing and improving curriculum? Providing an evidence based curriculum is important. We should be refining content often, while keeping in mind that the basics of reading, writing, and communication skills are what set our kids up for life.

Our curriculum is evidence based, but needs to be more inclusive not only in terms of community involvement but also in content and areas of study. I have asked for updates on curriculum, so we have those conversations publicly as a community.

The district uses a variety of curriculum systems and materials but they are all evidence based and they have been vetted by our Curriculum and Instruction office. Local curriculum mapping brings together teams of our district's teachers and content experts effectively implement in our district.

Yes, my experience is it is evidence based, as is the testing. Fads come and go, but we must always return to the basics. The Community, including students should openly discuss what is taught and issues brought to the School Committee. I am writing a book on the history the Lowell School System.



\$45M/y. Student is the biggest customer, school cafeteria should listen to them. The same company have been providing food services for many years, have done excellent job with LPS to provide food during COVID. I don't have an intention to change but I'd like to see what other food vendors offer.

How can staff diversity in the Lowell Public Schools be improved? We should review available studies, understand how to retain the diverse educators we have and how to attract new educators from diverse cultures. I will encourage a critical look at the "2+1" hiring practice that restricts a school's ability to recruit high quality educators outside of the district

This can become a very difficult task to accomplish. The amount of students entering into education in the colleges across the United States is very low. This is for a number of reasons; lower salaries than say an engineer, lack of respect given to our educators.

Monitoring the diversity and maintaining a balance.

For many years we have been speaking about having staff that reflects our population. One solution I had that worked well was to offer Teacher Academy to Lowell residents who already have a Bachelor degree and help them get MTEL. Educators are admirable Pro, & recruitment effort should start from LHS.

Are all of Lowell's schools on the same level? What would you do to bring them to the same level or maintain that equality?

Our schools are always going through change and there are many factors that contribute to the overall environment in each building. Fair student funding and our renaissance schools program help the district manage underperforming schools and provide a quick and efficient turnaround.

Each school has different needs based on the strengths/challenges of its students and staff. Fair Student Funding provides resources based on student needs. Strong professional development for teachers and leaders, and behavior/emotional supports for student will help each school improve.

The impact of remote learning and general disruption of so many of our student support programs will make it impossible to make any kind of valid MCAS performance comparisons. However, I do believe that fairness and equity must be priorities in all our district wide decisions.

Schools, physically, are near the same level, but academically more needs to be done. Key is the Superintendent's selection of principals. Important is English instruction, so all students are on the same level. Also, paraprofessionals who represent the demographic of the students are needed.

What will you do to improve the quality of the food served in our schools?

We have made small improvements to the quality of our food in recent years, but more has to be done. It is important that we hold our food service providers accountable for the product they serve everyday and continually seek to our best options. I have continually supported better quality food and have specifically asked for surveys to be done to determine what choices students prefer. Getting student preference and using good-quality ingredients with variety are key. This past school year was particularly challenging with the need for pick up and go meals as opposed to our usual in-school meals program. During this last term the school committee voted to increase the per meal cost in an effort to improve the quality of food served in our schools.

The Superintendent has been eating in all the cafeterias and is aware of individual issues. Our next step is to rebid the food service contract and consider other responsible bidders.

How can staff diversity in the Lowell Public Schools be improved? In an city like Lowell, I believe it is important to provide a fun and challenging atmosphere for every child. If our students develop pride in this city, and we educate them well, our own population will be more likely to want to return to teach here. We should be encouraging that pipeline.

Staff diversity has been improving. It starts with making the effort, which we have been doing. It also requires providing a welcoming and supportive environment for newcomers, another area that has seen renewed emphasis in recent years.

The administration has made a very conscious effort to broaden our recruitment and hiring strategies specifically to increase the number of teachers and administrators from diverse backgrounds. We have also put in place efforts to support our current cadre of paraprofessionals on the pathway to becoming on the pathway to becoming Massachusetts licensed teachers.

We need to expand the staff to provide the headspace to hire people of diversity. But, to provide input, we should provide scholarships to our college bound students in exchange for a promise to return to teach in Lowell Schools for four years.

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
